Australian Dress Register

The Australian Dress Register is a collaborative, online project about dress with Australian provenance. It includes men's, women's and children's clothing ranging from the special occasion to the everyday. Museums and private collectors are encouraged to research their garments and share stories and photographs, while the information is still available and within living memory. The Register encourages people to consider their collections very broadly and share what they know about members of their community, what they wore and life in the past. This provides access to a world-wide audience, while keeping the garments in their relevant location.

The site and its extensive resources provides a valuable forum for discussion within the museum community. It is a great resource for schools and universities, designers of fashion, film and television, along with researchers in many disciplines. The project is underpinned by training and support for the contributing organisations and private collectors.

The Australian Dress Register (ADR) is a collaboration involving the Powerhouse Museum, collecting institutions with dress collections, private collectors, and industry and sector specialists who have provided, and continue to provide, advice and guidance.

The Register has proved to be a resource-effective model for providing the skills and knowledge necessary for dress collectors to research, document and care for their collections according to best practice.

IRWIN DISTRICTS H.S. (DONGARA) - STRATEGIC PLAN RENEWAL - Bruce Baskerville

A good turn out of members made the strategic planning workshop on 19 October a great success, as well as the experience and skill of our independent facilitator Jen Thomas. Almost all of the goals in our 2019-2024 have been achieved, and the few that remained were incorporated into the draft new plan for 2023-2028. Our vision for the new period was greatly simplified to now read "The IDHS is a highly regarded community group, place and space for anything relating to history and heritage in the Irwin Districts".

The new strategic plan is arranged into four focus areas: Sharing Our Stories, Being Good Stewards, Being Sustainable and Engaging Near and Far. Within those four areas we now have 32 operations to fulfill over the next five years (these may yet be narrowed down), bringing us to the eve of WA's 200th anniversary in 2029. One

of those operations will be celebrating our own 60th birthday next year, when we will also be hosting the State History Conference in Dongara.

We already have operational plans or arrangements in place for some of the operations, and others will be developed as needed. The new strategic plan will be available on our website once the drafting is finalised and the plan is formally adopted by the committee. Thanks to everyone who has taken part in charting our way forward, including EGHS and MHPA who shared their strategic plans with us. This sort of collegiate sharing is, I think, one of the great benefits of RWAHS affiliation as it allowed us to focus on what we can contribute to our local communities and the broader historical society 'movement'.

Volunteers were on hand throughout the day, showcasing examples of photographs, brochures, household items, books, clothing etc, that are held in our collection. It was a great opportunity to meet with lots of different people, talking about the work the Society does to collect and store items, thus preserving the rich history of Guildford and the Swan Valley.



Cervantes Historical Society

- An addition to the 'Cervantes' outline at Ronsard Reserve on Corunna Road was put in place last week. A ship's wheel, beautifully crafted by Frank and members of the Men's Shed, was bolted into place. This was observed by members of the Historical Society, Men's Shed, community members and visitors. The wheel construction was funded by a CHART grant through

Museums Australia and stems from an idea of Historical Society member Coral McLay. The majority of the wheel project has come from recycled materials. It is mounted on a rescued piece of the Cervantes Fremantle Fishermen's Jetty, the base plates from the old water tower, jarrah from a Catalonia Street renovation and aluminium from members garage hoard. Shaun from Cervantes Aluminium

and Steel found some stainless parts in his stash and did the necessary welding welding. Photo credits to various members plus visitors Dale & Kellie. Thank you to all for the support.

Affiliates News

Maylands Historical and Peninsula Association put on the "Maylands History and Heritage Festival" from 4-11 November - to align with, and complement, the Maylands Street Festival on Saturday 11th.

Overall, it was judged to have been a great success by the participants with lots of positive comments and feedback throughout the week. As well as offering events for Members we also engaged with demographic groups that we would not normally see at one of our regular evening meetings. We had significant and direct interaction with around 200 community members as well as those who took one of the newly-printed cards for self-guided walks. A grant from the City of Bayswater enabled us to produce professionally designed and printed materials and engage an expert guide for the Art Walk.

Summary of Festival Activities

We held three Open Days for the public with around 40 visitors signing in at the Old Police Station. For Members we arranged a special preview of our major new display focussed on the Maylands Brickworks, covering the history of the brickworks until closure and the subsequent events concerning the claypits, lakes and possible future redevelopment. Around 25 Members, Sponsors and guests attended the special evening function where the display was officially opened by our new City of Bayswater Councillor, Nat Latter. Three different guided walks were organised and offered on two occasions each: Street Art Walk, Heritage Buildings Walk and Maylands Peninsula Walk: a total of 100 participants took part. The Heritage Buildings walk included pre-arranged tours inside four of the most significant heritage buildings in Maylands: the old Primary School (1903), The WA Institute for the BLind (1937), now the home of WA Ballet, the Presbyterian Church (1904) which is now home to Bold Park School and Maylands Hall (1921) which is now used by the WA Youth Jazz Orchestra as their home. Two lunchtime talks were given at the Library and attracted 35 people. MHPA set up a display stall as part of the Street Festival from where we issued cards for self-guided walks and entry forms for the Treasure Hunt / Picture quizzes devised for adults and children. All children were given a small gift and the winning adult entrant received a hamper with goods from IGA and vouchers from our Sponsors to the value of \$400.

Organising the Festival entailed an enormous amount of work for the Secretary and Committee and presenting the various events needed a small army of Volunteers helpers throughout the week.

We received many favourable comments along with heartfelt pleas to repeat the walks and talks at some time in the future! To be discussed......:)
