Eastern Goldfields Historical Society - This year sees Kalgoorlie-Boulder host the 33rd annual **Diggers & Dealers Mining Investment Forum and** for the first time, at the forum, the EGHS will have on display the ornate name plate that once adorned the mansion of W.G. Brookman that formerly stood on Adelaide Terrace, Perth.

Brookman along with Sam Pearce were the founders of the Great Boulder Gold Mine, (among other famous Boulder mines) and subsequently the Golden Mile. The nameplate weighs approximately 300 kg, so storing and moving this piece has been a challenge! However, recently we

had a custom stand made for the plate, making it a little bit more mobile. We are looking forward to seeing this piece on display around Kalgoorlie-Boulder.

The Great Boulder

In 1893, W.G. 'Willie' Brookman was one of the founders of the fabulous Great Boulder Mine on the Golden Although during his heyday he boasted that he had secured investments of £35 million for W.A., at his death Mile. Tarnished by insolvency issues when he and Sam Pearce found the gold, the proceeds from the rich leases they secured enabled him to discharge his debts. From 1895, he went on to live a very lavish lifestyle while purchasing an enormous amount of property in W.A.

in a style that made it Perth's most glittering showplace. As a tribute to the source of his wealth, Brookman carved verandahs. At the time of its demolition to make way for the IBM Centre, the ornate nameplate set up an ornate symbolic plaque on the corner tower of the house, with the words 'Great Boulder' across it. 'Great Boulder' was rescued and went to the Royal W.A. Historical Society headquarters in Nedlands to be At the 'Great Boulder' there was a spacious tennis lawn surrounded by formal flower gardens and in the

stables, a Benz motor car, one of the earliest in W.A.

He was Lord Mayor of Perth in 1900 and was also a member of the Legislative Council from 1900 to 1903. However, Willie Brookman's high life was short lived. By 1903 his fortune was rapidly declining and he was The EGHS thank Great Boulder Resources Ltd for their support in preserving this plaque again facing insolvency.

in 1910 at 50 years of age, his estate in W.A. was valued for probate at only £127 and in South Australia at less than £8.

Over time, 'Great Boulder' the Adelaide Terrace mansion became a rooming house, and later a car sales The Brookman's main residence, the 'Great Boulder'- was a two-story Adelaide Terrace mansion, furnished yard. By the time it was demolished in 1966, it had long been without its beautiful wrap-around ornately displayed on an outside wall.

> In the mid 1990's the plaque was offered to the Eastern Goldfields Historical Society and was conveyed to Kalgoorlie-Boulder.



Manjimup Historical Society - Manjimup Historical Society is housed within a purpose built, replica community hall within the Manjimup Heritage Park. The hall being one item within the Historical Hamlet of buildings, where the residents appear to have just left. The police station (1914) and goal, foresters office, school, settlers cottage and doctors surgery that form the Hamlet have been relocated from nearby. Replica vehicle, blacksmith and agricultural sheds make up the spaces in the Hamlet. Objects from the Society's collections can be found throughout these buildings. Australian Society of Archivists - Professional Development Day 2024. An ASA WA mid-year Professional Development (PD) day on the themes of Audiovisual Archives and Artificial Intelligence (AI) will be held on Friday, 2 August.

Who Should Attend: The event is aimed at archivists, collection managers and curatorial staff working in cultural heritage spaces such as archives, libraries, and museums. Information professionals with learning needs in audiovisual archives and AI will also find the program useful.

Description: This one-day professional development program builds foundation knowledge and skill in reformatting and preserving moving images and sound. It will explore good practices in digitisation, media care and preservation, description, outsourcing and the provision of access. The program also explores artificial intelligence and its application to archival methods

Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, you will be able to: 1. Identify and discuss the mains causes of deterioration and explain principles and practices in media care of moving images and sound.

2. Evaluate requirements for and plan for the use of re-formatting using digitization as the basis of preservation and access strategy.

3. Describe principles and good practices in analogue to digital reformatting and workflows for audio and video materials.

- 4. Make decisions and apply technology tools from the audiovisual archiving toolkit.
- 5. Apply good practices in the management of outsourcing of service provision.

6. Discuss the role of Artificial Intelligence in documentation and preservation of digital archives. The PD is aimed at assumed levels of knowledge ranging from beginner to intermediate.

Maylands Historical and Peninsula Association enjoyed another successful month of activity. On 17th June MHPA Volunteer Bevan Marshall gave a talk on the history and development of Perth's first airport – located on the Maylands Peninsula. Bevan's talk attracted one of the largest groups for many years with over 50 Members and Visitors crowding into the Dining Room at the Old Peninsula Hotel. Publicity for the talk also elicited a number of personal memories and anecdotes from local people who worked at the aerodrome or even flew out of Maylands. Bevan was contacted by Len, who used to work with him at Maylands aerodrome many years ago, but who now lives in Queensland. They had not been in contact for around 50 years but after reading about the talk on Facebook, Len contacted MHPA and now the two are having regular conversations as they reminisce of their days together at Perth's first airport.

members, taking membership to over 50. These additional membership fees will help to pay for utility bills, insurance premiums and general running costs that Grants and Awards do not cover!

Work is continuing to populate the digital map as featured in last month's Newsletter – all the four walks are now fully documented and work has started to develop the range of pins relating to *Heritage Houses in Maylands*. The next layers that we plan to work on will be *"Sports and Recreation"* and *"Green spaces and wetlands"*.

Melville History Society - A visit to a flour mill by Melville History Society in June fitted well, as the Society runs the Miller Bakehouse Museum in Palmyra. A Mega Flour Mill delivering to bakeries 60 tonne per day of unpackaged bulk flour via tanker, gives us an appreciation of the work that goes into "our daily bread". The Mill has ten huge silos to receive 600 tonne of wheat direct from farmers. Quality controls and sample testing on the flour making process and a testing bakery on site assure us of the quality of the flour that makes our bread.

Refresh of Significance 2.0

The Australian Government is proposing to refresh *Significance 2.0 a guide to assessing the significance of collections* to ensure that Australia continues to have a guide to assessing significance that meets the needs of contemporary collectors. It is envisioned that the revised guide will align with current and emerging best-practice standards in collections and cultural heritage management

Significance 2.0 was produced in 2009 by the Collections Council of Australia and continues to be widely used in Australia. It guides policies and processes in the Gallery, Library, Archive and Museum sectors, and allied fields. It is a teaching tool in university courses related to collections and cultural heritage management, and forms the basis of some grant programs and decisions on the management of our national cultural heritage. *Significance 2.0* also has applications beyond Australia. It was the basis for the United Kingdom's 2018 *Reviewing Significance 3.0* guide and there are Indonesian, Spanish, Portuguese and Swedish versions in use.

We invite stakeholders, particularly current users of *Significance 2.0*, to have their say on what aspects of *Significance 2.0* should be changed or maintained in the revised edition. This may include feedback on:

•the significance assessment framework

•appropriate ways to document significance in contemporary collecting contexts

- •the types of collection items featured in case studies
- •the balance of creators, themes, subject matter, and media representation across the guide
- any significance-related issues requiring particular guidance
 terminology
- •suggestions for useful tools or templates, and
- •the design and format of the guide.

We would also welcome suggestions for specific case studies that you think users of a revised guide could benefit from.

RWAHS State History Conference, 2024 Waves of Change - Dongara & Port Denison How to Get There, and then Get Around



DRIVE

South from Geraldton, Brand Highway - National Route 1, and Tourist Drive 354, 'Batavia Coast Way', via Greenough and Bookara, 64 kms.

West from Kalgoorlie, Great Eastern Highway – National Route 94 to Southern Cross then via Bullfinch, Kondut, Morawa (limited route numbering) and Mingenew, 817 kms.

North from Perth - three main routes

- Brand Highway, National Route 1, via Midland, Muchea, Badgingarra and Eneabba, 342kms
- Midlands Road/Great Northern Highway State Route 116 and Tourist Drive 360 'Midlands Way', via Midland, New Norcia, Three Springs and Mingenew, 326 kms.
- Indian Ocean Drive, State Route 60 via West Perth, Wanneroo, Cervantes, Jurien Bay and Leeman, 320 kms but note, the northern end from Leeman to Arrowsmith will be closed for roadworks between April and November, so just north of Leeman detour via Eneabba-Coolimba Road to Brand Highway and then on to Dongara via Arrowsmith.

All of these routes are scenic, with fuel stops, lookouts, layby/picnic areas, cafés and bakeries, hotels, camping/caravan parks, and of course local museums, along the way for more leisurely travelling around the Batavia Coast and North Midlands regions.

Petrol and Diesel – Liberty and BP roadhouses on Brand Highway Dongara, Ampol service station at junction of Moreton Terrace and Point Leander Drive in Dongara. See <u>Fuel Prices</u> <u>Australia</u> for locations and current (daily) fuel prices in Dongara and regionally.

Electric – EV charging stations at Jurien Bay (AC/DC, Bashford Street, x 3), Dongara (AC, Dongara Hotel, x 4), Geraldton (DC, Foreshore Drive x 4, and others), Northampton (AC/DC, x 3, Visitor Centre). See <u>RAC EV Charging Stations Map</u> for other regional stations.

Transwa bus services operate on all three drive routes from East Perth via Midland or Joondalup, and from Kalbarri via Geraldton - services daily with route variations, all the usual concession rates apply, pick up/set down

FLY, then drive or transfer

Qantas, Perth (Terminal 2) – Geraldton, daily return (1 hour flight time), and Nexus, Perth (Terminal 2) – Geraldton (daily), and 'Northern Route' regional cities (6 days/week).
